## New educational child restraint video resources

In 2018, 14 children died and a further 426 children were injured in crashes (MoT, 2019). Although most carers use child restraints, most are not installed correctly, and the use of child restraints declines with age (including under 7 years). Child restraints installation, care and maintenance are confusing topics for many carers - These new free educational video resources from Waka Kotahi aim to help carers, and they are valuable tools in helping us on the road to zero.

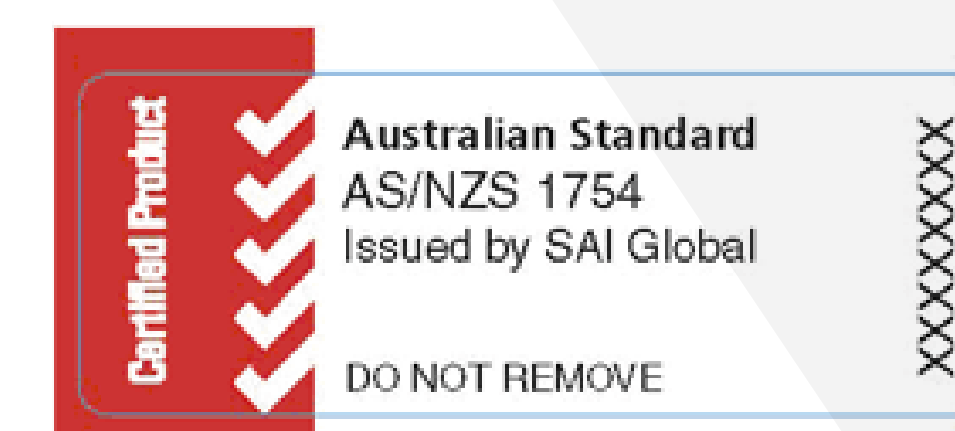

Look for a child restraint that shows:

- a tick mark (indicates the restraint meets the joint New Zealand/Australian Standard AS/NZ 1754)



- an 'E' mark (indicates the restraint meets the European Standard ECE 44 or ECE 129) - the number on the circle will vary depending on the country of certification.



Or, look for a restraint that complies with the United States Standard FMVSS 213. The restraint must also show the New Zealand Standard 'S' mark indicating it is certified for use here.
